MPUA: Key Actors

CEO

- Chief Executive
 Officer
- Mayor or other head of Municipality.
- Delegate (e.g. CAO).

Ministers

- Provincial
 Minister
 responsible for policing services.
- Federal Minister responsible for the RCMP.

Commissioner

 Commissioner of the National RCMP.

Commanding Officer


 Officer of the RCMP appointed by the Commissioner to command the Division.

Detachment Commander

 Member in charge of a Detachment who manages its physical, financial and human resources.



Art. 3: Purpose and Scope



- Canada provides & maintains the MPU.
- Responsibility to provide support staff.
- Temporary assistance to other police agencies in BC.


Art. 4: Management of the Police Unit



Management under control of Canada.



The level of policing service determined through consultation.



Standards and procedures in accordance with the provincial police standards and national RCMP standards.

Art. 5: Operation of the Police Unit



The CEO has authority to set objectives, priorities and goals.



The CEO has authority to receive information on progress.



Municipal input on appointment of the Member in Charge.

Art. 6: Increase or Reduction in the Police Unit

Art. 7: Resources and Organization



Changes to size of the police unit.




Consultation on resource levels.



Declared by the Commissioner.



Up to 10% of the PPS may be redeployed.



Costs borne by Canada.



Special Event



Based on Operational Assessment



A municipality receiving additional resources is responsible for the costs of redeployment.

Finances, Equipment, & Supplies



Financial Responsibilities: The Police Act



Art. 10: Accommodations And (Art. 14: Jails and Lock Ups)



must include:





Art. 11: Basis of Calculation of Payment



Costed at the applicable cost share. (70/30 or 90/10).



Equipment under \$150,000, Salaries (Wages and OT and Pension Contributions.



Recruitment and Cadet Training, Divisional Administration costs.



Exclusions include: Relocation of Personnel, Civil Claims and others.

Art. 12: Equipment



Canada is Responsible for selecting equipment for Municipal Police Units.



Consultation with municipalities.



National decisions made by the Commissioner sometimes supersede provincial and municipal decisions.

Type A over \$150K



Type B annual/recurring




Art. 13: Transfer of Ownership of Equipment



Only on Termination or expiry of the Agreement.

Art. 16: Financial Planning & Reporting



Throughout the annual budgeting process, Municipalities have the authority to provide information to the RCMP.

Assessments, Disputes and Committees



Art. 17: Operational Effectiveness Assessments





Municipalities may propose matters for assessment.



Assessments should be considered before an article 19 dispute is considered.

Art. 18: Local Government Contract Management Committee

And (Art. 21: Review)



A forum for contract policing-related matters.



CEO and Member in Charge attempt to resolve issue informally.




A notice of dispute is provided in writing.
